William Adair, founder of Gold Leaf Studios in Washington, D.C., says he has his “hands constantly in the cookie jar of design histories” when conceiving frame styles. *Opposite:* Adair credits Walter Gropius, whose Massachusetts home, shown, is a national landmark, for treating architecture as fine art.

When William Adair visits a museum, he doesn't so much study a painting as he does what borders it. “I will not even consider looking at a piece of artwork that has an improper frame,” says Adair, a frame artisan and historian, and the owner of Gold Leaf Studios in Washington, D.C. “I'm much more interested in the dynamic between the painting and the frame, and the era from which it came.” From his back-alley studio near Dupont Circle, Adair and a team of expert craftsmen and gilders work with museums, art dealers and collectors, interior designers, and private clients to repair original frames, some of which date back to the Renaissance; copy historic designs to match the pedigree of the clients' artwork; or source original frames from a particular artist's era. They also create their own designs. “There aren't that many people who work in the care and connoisseurship of frames,” Adair says, adding, “Every frame that we make, we sign on the back as if it is a piece of art.” goldleafstudios.com; 202.833.2440
